## LETTER FROM THE WORLD'S MOST FAMOUS THEOLOGIAN

Our Church Council decided to send \$50.00, part of the Christmas Eve offering, to Dr. Karl Barth, faculty member of the University of Basel, Basel, Switzerland, for the relief of Evangelical refugees who have been forced to leave Germany. It was felt that since Prof. Barth was himself a refugee, the money, which amounted to 219 Swiss francs, would without delay be given to the needlest people who had knocked at his door for help.

Dr. Barth's letter of thanks was written in German and reads as fol-

Esteemed Pastor:

The fine contribution for Evangelical Germans, who have been driven from their homeland, has been received by me and I wish to thank you and your Church Council most heartily. It is indeed a fact, that many refugees come to me and there are even some among my students; hence the money can be put to very good use. It is comforting and heartening to know that the Church in distant places is so deeply concerned about this need and is sharing some of the load.

Permit me to send to you a copy of my latest publication and to thank you for the parish paper which I read with interest.
