"Against the Stream," by
Karl Barth (S.C.M. Press,
16s)—The most influential
Christian thinker in Europe
has gathered together a number of his post-war writings.
He makes clear the line he
believes that the Church should
take in regard to the State,
and says much else that is very
relevant to our condition today.

"The Legacy of Luther," by
E. W. Zeeden (Hollis and
Carter, 25s).—Martin Luther,

object of veneration in Germany, and still exerts a great
influence on German religion.
This book traces the results of
his break with Rome in the

changing attitudes of the 17th and 18th centuries. The author argues that freedom of conscience has been destructive of the Christian faith itself. This is debatable, to say the least of it.
