Dear Professor Barth,

I have just finished reading "Der gute Hirte"-the 10th of the series of "Theologische Existenz Heute" Awhich I have read with great interest and appreciation from the beginning. They have enabled me to keep in touch with the situation, and also to help to guide others. From Theodor Hesse also, who spent a night with me, and with whom I have corresponded, I have also learned much.

But I look forward greatly to the possibility of seeing you personally in Bonn next month. My wife's sister now lives in Brück-Köln, and we propose to go there towards the end of July. She has also relatives still in Bonn, and I intend to spend a few days with them in Bonn. During August we shall probably go for a holiday to the Black Forest.

I am looking forward with the greatest interest to meeting you again. I know that you will have many who desire to speak with you, but I shall consider your convenience as much as I can.
