Dear Professor Barth,

I have been meaning  
to write you for some time to thank  
you once more for the reminders you  
send me from time to time that you are  
remembering one of your old pupils. But  
now I have further to say how de-  
lighted I was the other week to get  
the offer from Geneva of procuring  
a copy of your 1928-9 lectures on  
Ethics. I have already received the  
first volume and have been reading  
it with great interest. The second  
volume which I await with great  
eagerness will, I understand, contain  
the lectures I myself heard you  
deliver in Münster. I always

regretted missing that first course  
of lectures which I felt were necessary  
for the proper understanding of the  
second course, and now through your  
kindness I am to have the lack made  
good. I am very proud indeed that  
you gave my name as that of one  
who would be anxious to have a copy  
of your lectures and I shall prize  
them greatly.

I hope you are happy in your new  
work in Basel and that everything will  
go well with you and yours. You will  
please remember that when you come  
to Scotland you will be more than  
welcome in our home if we can be  
of any use to you. And even if you  
cannot stay with us you must  
certainly come and see us.

I am now well in my first  
year in Edinburgh and am very  
well content with the conditions of  
work there. I have at the whole a  
fine set of students and of course  
most delightful colleagues. It is pretty  
hard work writing new courses of lectures

but I hope soon to be able to settle down to do some writing. I am anxious to make an examination of the sociological approach to the Old Testament which meets with so much favour to-day and to try to show wherein it is inadequate. I'm not altogether happy about Vischer's Christusgegenis in A.T. which I have been reading with much interest. It seems to me that he makes unnecessary difficulties for those who recognise the relative truth of many of the results of Biblical Criticism. But the book is very stimulating nevertheless, and I await the subsequent volumes with interest.
