Dear Professor Barth,

When we published your Deneke Lecture on Trouble and Promise in the Struggle of the Church in Germany, it was arranged that if it produced any profit, that profit should be available for you. As you know, in agreement with Miss Deneke, we allowed the Lecture to go out of print when permission was given, with your consent, for its circulation in a very cheap or free form. None the less it succeeded in making a small profit - which is by no means our usual experience of lectures in these days - and I should now be glad to pay you £5.5.0 on that account, if you will let me know to what address I should send the cheque.

I very much hope that you will some day give us the opportunity of publishing a full-dress book by you. The English and American public are greatly interested in your work, but the pamphlet or lecture form is economically not a satisfactory one as compared with a book: the fact is that modern booksellers, who have to keep elaborate accounts, do not like dealing with small items like pamphlets, and devote their energies to the sale of books. It would give us great pleasure if at any time you

had a book of which you could offer us the rights in the English language: still more, if you would write a book specially for us, especially with a view to the English-reading public.
